Chimp loves the written word and has authored seven books and recently added an eighth —his first western novel, *Billy Howard and The Buckskin*—to his list of publishing credits. He's also had many stories, articles, and poems published by various magazines and newspapers, including the *Western Horseman*, *Cattlemen*, *Horse Lover's*, *Hoofs and Horns*, *Farm Journal*, *Yamaha World*, *Paint Horse*, and *Horseman* and has been featured locally in *Access West* magazine. ## Tip for Writing a Hook

Okay, so you finish your book and it's all nice and polished, what's next? Getting it published.

Whether you choose a traditional publisher or go the self-pub route, you need a very solid one-line hook that will pique an editor's or a reader's interest right off. But how to condense a whole book into one sentence? Start with making a list of key, emotion-charged, words that describe your story. Vivid words like danger, suspense, passion, deceit, lies, stolen, death, hunger, secret, etc., trigger the response you want. Those are powerful and evoke an image right off.

Here's mine from REDEMPTION: "Two brothers ... one woman ... and a secret that could destroy them all."

The allure of something forbidden, something dangerous draws a reader in. The first thing you have to understand is that you don't need to tell the whole book. To begin this process, write two or three paragraphs (something like the back blurb) that hit the highlights then start whittling it down. I've found that more than three paragraphs complicates things too much and I get bogged down in too many details. Keep it simple and include powerful nouns, adjectives, and active verbs. You want just enough to tease and make a reader sit up and beg for more.

#### Critique Session Guidelines

To participate in the critique session, you do not need to have a piece to be critiqued. The sessions begin at 1 p.m. and, depending on the number of those who have a story or a

those critiquing have some background. We ask that you format your manuscript as follows:

1. Use white 8.5 by 11-inch paper.

2. Double space using either Times New Roman 12 or similar font.

- 3. In the header, give your last name, a slash (/), and a short title on the left and the page number on the right (at the top of each page).
- 4. Use one-inch margins.
- 5. Use one side of the paper only.
- 6. If possible, use line numbering.
- 7. Note: Your synopsis may be single-spaced.

Each person, in turn, will read 1,000 words or less (15 to 20 minutes) or the author will read their own writing, based on preference; then, the group facilitator will ask for discussion from the group. While each person is reading, we urge all other participants to offer written comments on the manuscript. All copies will be returned to each author.

The goal of every critique is: "How can we make it better."

Meetings are held on the third Saturday in odd-numbered months: January, March, May, July, September, and November.

The public and Texas High Plains Writers members are invited to hear speakers on selected writing or related topics.

You may order a box lunch from our Hospitality Director between 9:30 and 10:15 or bring a sack lunch. Box lunches are \$10.

Unless otherwise specified, meeting location is at Amarillo Senior Citizens Center 1217 S. Tyler Amarillo, Texas (Note: We must occasionally switch our meeting location, or we may need to change the date to avoid conflicts. So, please check the address and date for each meeting.)
